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

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

Hundreds of thousands of people needed aid after the earthquakes in Afghanistan last October. Thankfully, you stepped in.

RISING FROM THE RUBBLE

ore than 1,500 people were killed in the terrible earthquakes that struck Herat, Afghanistan, last October. But thankfully, BMS World Mission supporters were

there to give a lifeline to those in desperate need. Here's how your giving to our disaster recovery fund made an incredible difference.

Since the Taliban takeover of Afghanistan in 2021, people have been living on the brink, with intense food insecurity, major restrictions on women's ability to work and a lack of aid entering the country. A roof over your head can mean a lot in such a tumultuous environment – so when the earthquakes hit, people needed much more than just emergency supplies. They needed someone to help them get through the horror of losing their homes and loved ones. And that's where you stepped in.

Your generosity made it possible for a grant of £25,000 to go to our partner to help with both emergency recovery and mental health services to help with the long-term recovery from the quakes.

"I am so thankful for the opportunity we were given to support those worst affected by the earthquake through the funding that we received from BMS," says BMS worker Tim*, who heads up our partner in Afghanistan. "We were able to provide practical support, such as distributing cash, blankets and hygiene kits. We also provided counselling to those most affected and who had tragically lost loved ones, spoke to people who now live in fear of another earthquake, and shared messages with the public to increase wellbeing."

Thanks to your generous support, a nation on the edge can now begin to rebuild after this tragedy.



No family, no language, no hope. That's how many refugees arrive in Cyprus. But your support is helping change that.

ara is expecting her first baby. Her eyes light up as she tells me in broken English that she's six months along, and that she and her husband are keeping the baby's sex a surprise.

But Lara's pregnancy is a far cry from how she expected to bring a baby into the world. She's thousands of miles away from her family in Kurdistan, Iraq – in fact, she's not sure she'll ever see her family again. Lara isn't her real name. Her father had planned to marry her off to one of her uncles, so she and her now husband left to start a new life in Cyprus, where tension still bubbles under the surface, 50 years on from the Turkish invasion in 1974. I ask Lara what her hopes are for her new life. She's a pharmacist and would love to be able to work here and help people. She dreams of visiting Mecca one day. And she's exited for the arrival of her baby – although she cannot know what kind of life she'll be able to give them.

It's a hot morning in Larnaca on the day I visit the Oasis, the aptly-named centre for displaced peoples run by BMS World Mission partner All4Aid. It's Friday, which means clothing distribution day. It's just one of many activities that takes place in the centre, which serves refugees living in Larnaca and the nearby transit camp. Cyprus might seem like a surprising hotspot for refugees and asylum seekers – an island known as either a tourist destination or a war zone. I confess to feeling a little guilty as I wander the rooms and racks of clothing on offer. I myself have taken time out of my family holiday to come here. Once the morning is over, we will drive back to a town of white villas, sandy beaches and sunburnt strip. I'm getting a glimpse of Cyprus' complicated culture, one which can both help and hinder the people like Lara trying to make a stable life here on the island.

THE OASIS IS MY FAMILY



You're helping provide computer training and necessary food for refugees in Larnaca - thank you!

Elena is the only Cypriot working at the centre. She's constantly buzzing from person to person, helping out wherever she can. She explains to me why so many refugees end up here. Many are convinced by traffickers that Cyprus is a gateway to mainland Europe. There's a large number of people fleeing war in Syria or conflict in countries like Somalia and D R Congo. They take boats to the north of the island and are then smuggled across the border - where everything begins to

unravel. "They're telling them lies and lies and lies," says Elena. "And they come here. Then they realise that they're stuck in a small island with no industry, no work, no housing, and their lives are so difficult."

The tourism and hospitality industries do provide some opportunities for seasonal work – in fact, they're some of the few areas where refugees are allowed to work – but they also contribute to the housing problems in Cyprus. It's hard for even Cypriots to find housing, and refugees in transit camps have to provide a permanent address to leave the camps. Many make up addresses just so they can leave – and then end up sleeping on the beaches and sunbeds. It's why the Oasis gives out so many sleeping bags. And it's why they're determined to help whoever they can, however they can.

As well as the clothing distribution today, the centre runs a women's group on Tuesdays and food distribution on Mondays, as well as English

and Greek classes. And you've generously helped fund computers and sewing machines so the centre can open a computer lab and crafting room in the autumn – creating even more avenues for people to find work and community.

The centre's impact on local refugees is clear to see. All of the refugees I spoke to today are also volunteers, keen to give back after the welcome they received. Lara works on the welcome desk and helps translate where necessary. But more than the practical help, the Oasis lives up to its namesake as a place of sanctuary. "The number one need is not housing or food or accommodation," explains Elena. "It's having somebody to listen." As Lara puts it: "The Oasis is my family."

I catch Lara again as she browses the clothes on offer. She picks up a pair of baby shoes, and we smile together as I tell her about my niece and nephew, just old enough to wear shoes like those. I hope she understands my English, that we share a genuine moment of connection before I go home.

I don't know whether or when Lara will achieve her dreams. But I know that God is there in this mixed up, pieced-together community she knows to be home. And I can't help but think that if we all chose to live like they do at the Oasis, things might just be a little bit better.

I WILL TELL MORE PEOPLE, SO THEY CAN HAVE LIFE

Seeking first the Kingdom in Bangladesh.

We sit, savouring the light breeze that occasionally embraces us. Yesterday was a cold winter's day in the UK. Today, we're engulfed in Bangladeshi sunshine. The baptismal pool glimmers. Still. Just a few minutes ago, we watched 13 people celebrate rebirth in this water. Each man and woman emerging to new life with the sound of Bangla singing. Their brothers and sisters celebrating with them as they took this bold step on their journey with Christ.

t's quiet now, aside from birds singing hope in the trees.

We're waiting to interview Javed*, the man who courageously led each of these people to Jesus, and who hopes to baptise many more in the coming months and years. Javed and the group travelled for four hours to get here, rising with the sun to join

us at the Bangladesh Baptist Church Sangha (BBCS) in Dhaka for their baptisms.

In a couple of days, we'll be in the east of Bangladesh, in some tea gardens. We'll see Bina Roy and James Biswas sharing the love of Jesus with tea plantation workers living in poverty and facing huge challenges. Then, we'll travel to the other side of the country, just across the border from Kolkata, to hear Rev John Karmakar, Rev Barnabas Hembron, and Pete and Louise Lynch bring good news to a Christian revival meeting.

From east to west, we'll see lives transforming. God's Kingdom coming in Bangladesh. Not in giant waves, but in ripples. In small screenings of the Jesus film, and families gathered together in houses to worship. In hospitality, and friendship, and long, desperate hours of prayer for healing.

In the words and actions of Javed, Bina, James, John, Barnabas, Pete and Louise - BMS World Missionsupported pastors faithfully serving God in this densely populated, immensely beautiful country. A country where just 0.3 per cent of people are Christian.

These faithful men and women are seeking first the Kingdom, and this harvest, they're asking you to help them.

"Jesus is not only for Christians," Javed says. He's taken Communion with the newly baptised believers and is now ready to tell us all about his growing ministry. "He came to save us all."

Javed grew up Muslim. His dad is a well-respected Muslim leader, responsible for many thousands of people. But one day Javed started thinking about Jesus. And once he'd started asking questions, he couldn't stop. "I saw that the Qu'ran wrote many times about Jesus Christ," Javed says. "I decided that I will find him."

An online platform led Javed to





BBCS General Secretary and BMS partner worker Rev John Karmakar, and it wasn't long before he and six of his friends were making the journey to Dhaka to meet John and find out more about Jesus.

"They welcomed us very well and they told us about Jesus Christ," Javed says. He and his friends went away encouraged to keep seeking Jesus. Which they did. On his next visit to BBCS, Javed arrived as one of 13 new believers from his community. All of them wanted to get baptised.

"I started thinking again, Jesus... came to save all the people," says Javed. "I decided that I will tell more people they can have life. When we have more experience of Jesus Christ, then we have peace. We are trying to make a new generation – a new Christian community from the Muslim people."

Today is another milestone on Javed's journey as a Christian and an evangelist. Thirteen more people baptised into an ever-growing family of disciples. The number of believers MOTHERS ARE NOW SEEKING MEDICAL CARE... CHILDREN WHO WERE PREVIOUSLY NOT ATTENDING SCHOOL ARE NOW ENROLLED


in his community doubled. And his work only just getting started.

Over in the east of the country, James and his wife Bina share Javed's passion. "I love preaching the gospel in Bangladesh," James says. More than ten years ago, God called Bina and James to minister to people living and working in the tea gardens, many of whom struggle with generational poverty, limited education options and poor health. Bina and James are working to bring life in all its fullness in these communities, and they're currently reaching about 3,000 people.

"Through our efforts, we have witnessed positive changes," Bina says. "Mothers are now seeking medical care and eating nutritious meals during pregnancy, leading to a decrease in maternal mortality rates. Children who were previously not attending school are now enrolled, and we see remarkable progress in their lives. And many individuals have embraced Christianity and are eager to learn more."

God's Kingdom is coming in Bangladesh. Not in giant waves, but in ripples. In 26 newly baptised Muslim background believers now sharing Jesus with their neighbours. In children getting the chance to go to school, and mothers surviving childbirth. It's coming through the faith, words and actions of a few inspiring men and women you help support when you give to BMS.

And we want to make those ripples bigger. We want to support more



people in Bangladesh and see more lives transformed by Jesus. That's why BMS has a plan to train up 120 more workers like James, Bina and Javed over the next five years – equipping more of God's people to share Jesus with the 170 million men, women and children in Bangladesh who haven't yet met him. And we can't do it without you.

This harvest, will you help grow God's Kingdom in Bangladesh?

Before he heads back home, Javed has one final thing to say: "I love Jesus Christ because he loves me, and I want to share this love with other people. One day we need to go to him – this is the time to tell people so we can go together."

We sit, engulfed in Bangladeshi sunshine. The baptismal pool glimmering beside us. A few minutes ago, we watched 13 people celebrate rebirth in this water. Each man and woman emerging to new life with the sound of Bangla singing. A taste of heaven on earth. It's quieter now, but the birds are still singing hope in the trees. • Praise God that people are committing themselves to Christ. Please pray that Javed will reach even more people through his ministry.

Location: Bangladesh

Committing the past 20 years to full-time ministry, Barnabas is determined to help spread the good news across Bangladesh. In his time, Barnabas has been a Sunday school organiser, youth leader and pastor - but before all this he was a professional footballer! However, when he attended a spiritual revival camp as a young adult, God called him to step away from this path and to embrace the world of mission.

Currently Barnabas is working for BMS partner the Bangladesh Baptist Church Sangha as their Mission Co-ordinator, helping steer their evangelism and mission programmes. Alongside this, Barnabas likes to keep busy: he helps moderate the Department of Evangelism, Ethnic Unity and Culture at the National Church Council of Bangladesh, he's the pastor of the Baptist Church in Dhaka and he's also a tutor at the College of Christian Theology Bangladesh!

Since he was 15, Pastor J has dived face-first into the challenge of pastoring the Global Church. Pastor J felt called to ministry while studying in 1999 and began his theological studies after completing his master's degree. He was ordained in 2008 and began working at the Baptist Church of Mizoram in north west India.

In 2013, Pastor J and his wife Lalrengpuii were chosen to be sent to Cambodia.

As part of his role in Cambodia, Pastor J pastors the Horaios Baptist Church and runs a dormitory ministry.

The dorm ministry was set up to help make further education a viable option for students from rural areas by offering them an affordable place to live. At the dorm, students can take English and computer classes, and many students have found

Wissam grew up in Saudia Arabia after fleeing Lebanon to escape the civil war, and gave his life to God when he was 14.

Justice for children appeal

SMILES OF HOPE IN UGANDA

Children are at risk right now in Gulu, Uganda. Could you help them?

magine having to look after your one-week-old baby boy completely on your own. You've got no support from the baby's father,

plus you have to look after your two older sons, and get back to work farming your land as soon as you can – it's the only way you can provide for your children. That was exactly the situation Apiyo* found herself in – before your support changed everything.

The children's father did nothing to support his sons or their mother, despite his well-paying job. When BMS World Mission-supported Child Protection Officer Valerie gave Apiyo clothes, soap and oil for her new baby, she burst into tears. "You're strangers," Apiyo said. "You've brought things that even the father of the child has not brought. He's never bought anything for his child."

Valerie works with BMS partner Justice Livelihoods Health and splits her time between working on specific


cases of child abuse and neglect, and raising awareness in villages and schools across Gulu, Uganda. She first learnt about this case when Apiyo spoke to her after a village meeting on Uganda Human Rights Day. "A lot of children are going through a lot of abuse," she says. "Often the parents were raised in abusive homes themselves, so then that has just carried on to their families."

After listening to Apiyo's story, Valerie went to meet the father of the three children. He refused to pay school fees for his two older sons, so Valerie warned him that she would involve the probation officer and the authorities if he continued to neglect his children. "In the end," says Valerie, "he came back to me and said, 'Valerie, here are the receipts for the school fees I have paid.' I called the headteacher, and he had paid the school fees for the two boys, which made us very happy."

Sending children to school, especially girls, is one of best ways of ending child abuse and gender injustice. "Girls are either dying from childbearing when they are very young," says Valerie, "or they're dying from abuse from their partners because they were married off to older men. So, when we advocate for keeping girls in school, just as boys are kept in school, then we are getting rid of all these other problems that would arise if they got married."

Valerie also runs classes for parents, teaching them to raise children in a way that is not too authoritative or lenient. She often finds it difficult to encourage fathers to join in – but has hope that through

education, many fathers will step up to see their roles as equally important as the mothers.

Even though the father of Apiyo's children agreed to pay the school fees for his older sons, he still did not want to look after his baby. "The child has basic needs," Valerie told him. "He needs nappies, he will need milk very soon, and bottles. He'll need washing soap." Because Valerie stepped in, the father has now given Apiyo what she needs to look after her baby – and she knows that her sons' lives are safeguarded for the future.

"Thank you for fighting for the rights of my children," Apiyo told Valerie.

"When she called, you could

feel the smile and the gratitude in her words when she was speaking," says Valerie. "Because at first when we met her, she did not have that. She was bitter, she was angry, she was frustrated – but now she has hope."

It's thanks to your support that Valerie is able to help protect and safeguard the children of Gulu – and Valerie is deeply grateful for what God is doing through her work. "Seeing how God has used me to bring back hope in these children's lives and to give them the future that God has for them – that brings a big, big, big thank you in my heart for God," she says. Every little smile of hope that Valerie sees makes her work worth doing. There are many more children in Uganda who need your support to stay in school and be set free from abusive homes.

A letter from Palestine

We cry out in prayer for a peaceful resolution to the conflict in Gaza. Jack Y. Sara, President of BMS World Mission partner Bethlehem Bible College (BBC), based in the West Bank, shares how they've been affected by the war and how you can pray.



Dear friends,

Despite the challenges and uncertainties brought by the war in Gaza, we continue to find hope and strength through our faith in Jesus Christ.

The war has significantly impacted the work of Bethlehem Bible College (BBC). Our daily routines have occasionally been disrupted, and the tense security situation has made it difficult for many students and teachers to reach the college safely. However, we remain committed to providing education and spiritual support to those who can attend, and we are diligently working to expand our online programs to reach a broader audience, especially among Arabic speakers globally.
